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

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EDITORS' DESK



The internet is a wonderful thing. But you know that already. Why am I commenting on the obvious?

The software we use for making Northlander is Adobe InDesign. There is a huge amount of literature available on this product and every so often I buy a book or subscribe to a blog just to stay up to date. A recent book review caught my attention: Nigel French's InDesign Type (4th Edition) by Mike Rankin. As part of his review Mike Rankin quoted a piece by John McWade.

So there, in the space of a few minutes, I had three names and opinions to investigate. The internet is a wonderful thing answers were three clicks away. John McWade is a graphic designer and an educator. He is editor of Before & After, a graphic arts magazine. His blog is a delight.

The particular piece written by John McWade referred to in the book review is written in support of print and paper. I think this is worth sharing and I will quote the whole piece below. Why would I do such a thing? Because we here at Northlander support print and paper too; and because we are about to call for subscriptions for Northlander 2019.

The internet is a wonderful thing. But I cannot imagine a world without printed magazines. If magazines go to online only will books be next? Can you imagine such a world? The convenience of the internet and linked material does not offset the pleasure of paper.

John McWade: Why I still Love Paper

The reason I read a paper magazine or book is for the time it gives me – for the space to think, reflect, pause, return, re-read, and so on until what's on the page has morphed from an idea to something deeper.

Online, and even on a tablet, is a different experience. There's a light in my face. There's an urgency. It has no closure; there's always another click, an eternal, forever, world-without-end-amen stream of data rushing, flowing, pounding, demanding, agitating.

Paper gets me away from that.

When all voices are equal, I have to listen to all voices. I can't afford this mentally, emotionally or physically. When all data is available, I have to process all data. I'm not big enough.

Paper edits for me.

I once worked with a guy to make a hobby magazine in PDF. His content was 100% from a large online forum. I asked him why he'd do this — why he'd charge for the exact content that hobbyists could get for free online.

He said it's because the forum is like a river; the water flows by and downstream and away. The magazine dips in and scoops some out, stopping it. It adds images, typography, visual rhythm and alters its environment, and in so doing it changes the experience by giving me space.

It's an important quality that we can't afford to lose, and my quess is that we won't.

Yes, some paper publishing is for tradition or power or status quo or because it's what we're used to. These things will change. But the essential ways in which paper is truly superior, these are here to stay.

Talk to me.
















NCR Autocross 4 August 11, 2018 WET WET WET

Autocross #4 was a calamity of circumstances. We were short-staffed with six core workers unable to attend and registrations were low due to some combination of vacation season, the NER DE at Watkins Glen and a questionable weather forecast. The sandwich shop owner who supplies our discount lunch subs informed us earlier in the week that he would be closed for an emergency family trip. I was able to arrange with another shop just in time. The forecast turned worse, promising nearly 100% chance of heavy rain so even more cancellations poured in. We had a record number of cancellations. Fortunately, two very dedicated staff members who were unable to drive helped out by showing up and working both heats. We were also fortunate that we had several top drivers preparing for SCCA Nationals in a few weeks which meant we had a lot of experienced workers.

We ended up with only 64 drivers and the AM weather got a little better. We did 4 morning runs. The first run group drove in mostly dry conditions; the second group drove in rain. We took a long lunch to dry out and to adjust the course for the rain that would persist all afternoon. We were well on our way to completing 4 afternoon runs when a car lost an oil drain plug and drained oil over half of the course. With all that oil on top of a wet course and more rain still falling heavily, there was no reasonable way to clean it all up at that time. For safety, I terminated the event. By rule, if all run groups do not complete two runs in a session, all runs in that session are discarded. This was particularly unfortunate as the first run group had completed all four runs and there were a lot of changes in leads and positions but we had to abide by the rules and discard all of the runs from the afternoon session for both groups. Normally a competitor's official score is the sum of their best morning run and their best afternoon run.

The 2018 NCR Loaves & Fishes Autocross on September 30 will be our final event. Once again proceeds will be donated to the Loaves & Fishes food pantry. Registration is open on ncr-pca. motorsportreg.com/ and is open to all licensed drivers. I hope we have better weather for both events!



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Not Just Another Woman Driver

For some of us, our Porsche adventures have just begun; for others it has been a passion pursued for many years. For Kristin Larson, it has literally been a lifetime of Porsches and track experiences. In her words, "I am a child of PCA."

Kristin's parents, Rick and Laurel Townsend, began driving PCA DE events in 1968 with the Golden Gate Region in CA before they moved on to the Northern New Jersey Region. There they served as President and Chief Instructors for many years. Kristin remembers summers going to the Poconos, Lime Rock and Watkins Glen, riding her bike over mounds of dirt and undeveloped areas of the infields. One fond memory was, as a six-year old, sitting in the passenger seat of their 1970 911 S with her dad's helmet jiggling around on her head, as her mom drove her around the track in a Black Session at WGI. She remembers having to look out of the side windows as they went down into the Laces because she wasn't tall enough to see out the front windshield! At the end of the events, the kids would enthusiastically jump into the NNJR van to ride around the track and help the exhausted adults retrieve the club's apex and track out cones. Not a bad way to learn the line! In 1969, Kristin's mom did a 360 on the track at West Bend during time trials at Lime Rock nothing particularly unusual except for the fact that she was 7 months pregnant with her older brother Scott at the time

Both Kristin and Scott are now DE Instructors. It must be something in the genes, this need for speed and love of the track!

Kristin and her partner Dave Berman signed up with the Northeast Region PCA in 2009 driving a 1983 911 SC. Their first event was the NCR Spring Opener at NHMS, where they did the skid pad and braking exercises before going out onto the track in the afternoon. They both had a great time and were hooked. Since then, they have done about 20-25 track days each year, doing almost every NER and NCR event offered. They progressed to a 1985 Carrera which they drove on the track for 5 years. Dave did the majority of maintenance and upgrades, which he enjoyed doing, while Kristin explained that she has tended to follow her mother's philosophy of "It's your job to keep the car running; it is my job to drive it." More recently, Kristin and Dave purchased the "Apple" car, a 2011 Cayman S Interseries, a car so cool everyone wants to ride in it! Not only does it go fast, but it has power steering. :o)

Today Kristin's family uses track events as family reunions. The photo shows Kristin, Scott, Dave, Laurel and Rick at a long weekend in Watkins Glen. They are a family of 5 instructors. Kristin's dad has since passed, but not before the Townsend family was awarded the PCA "Family of the Year" Award, a high honor bestowed by the National organization.

One more important thing to mention is that Kristin has given generously of her time and talents to the NER PCA organization. She has served as Treasurer, as well as President and Past President. On the NER track committee, she has headed up Control Operations and is presently on the Social Committee. She continues to instruct at DE events.

Podium for Porsche at Silverstone — victory in the GTE-Am class

In a turbulent round three of the FIA World Sports Car Championship WEC at Silver-stone in Great Britain, Kévin Estre from France and Michael Christensen from Denmark finished on third place at the wheel of the 510 hp Porsche 911 RSR with the number 92. The No. 91 sister car driven by Austria's Richard Lietz and Gianmaria Bruni from Italy initially scored second, however was subsequently disqualified due to an irregularity in the ride height. Witnessed by 60,240 spectators, ten vehicles from five manufacturers fought for victory in the GTE-Pro class this weekend. Four additional Porsche 911 RSR race cars tackled the GTE-Am class in the UK. Victory went to Dempsey Proton Racing with Porsche Young Professional Matt Campbell (AUS), Christian Ried (Germany) and Porsche Junior Julien Andlauer (F). Porsche continues to lead the manufacturers' classification in the GTE-Pro class as well as the drivers' classification of both the GTE-Pro and GTE-Am classes in the WEC.

Under partly cloudy skies and with a temperature of 23-degrees Celsius, British spectators were treated to a gripping race with many changes at the front of the field. Estre and Christensen drove a spirited race. Estre made an inspired start in the No. 92 Porsche 911 RSR. The Frenchman got away well off the line and made the most of a collision amongst the front pack of the 34-strong field to sweep to the front of the GTE-Pro class. When his teammate, Christensen, experienced tyre problems in the second stint, they fell back to position six, however, thanks to a good pit stop strategy, the pair worked their way back up to the front and at times held the lead. Towards the end of the race, however, they had to let vehicles pass. The two Le Mans winners continue to lead the drivers' classification of the WEC.

The GTE-Am category also treated fans to some enthralling race action. Heading into the race from P2, the Dempsey Proton Racing squad with Porsche Young Professional Campbell, Ried and Porsche Junior Andlauer crossed the finish line first after 168 laps. Starting from pole posi-tion, the Project 1 team with Porsche works driver Jörg Bergmeister (Germany), Patrick Lindsey (USA) and Egidio Perfetti (N) led the field over two-thirds of the race. A stop-and-go penalty as a result of a pit stop error relegated the team back to position five, however the trio manoeuvred their way up the field to third place and celebrated their first podium result in the WEC. Michael Wainwright (GB), Ben Barker (GB) and Alex Davison (AUS) achieved sixth place for the Gulf Racing customer team. Gianluca and Giorgio Roda (I) as well as Porsche Young Professional Matteo Cairoli (I) brought the second Porsche 911 RSR fielded by Dempsey Proton Racing home in eighth.

Round four of the FIA World Sports Car Championship WEC is contested on 14 October in Fuji (Japan).

Comments on the race

Pascal Zurlinden (Director GT Factory Motorsport): "Unfortunately we were informed after the race that an irregularity was detected in the ride height. That threw our number 91 car out of the classification and advanced the number 92 car to third place. We're still leading the manufac-turers' and drivers' classifications. Now we need to focus on the next tasks."

Kévin Estre (Porsche 911 RSR #92): "Our race started well and I moved into first place after the start and built up a comfortable lead. Unfortunately, Michael was hampered by tyre problems during his stint. We had to call him in earlier than planned and change our strategy. This enabled the Ferrari to overtake us in the pits. At the end, our tyres weren't fresh enough to attack again. Still, I'm satisfied with our result."

Michael Christensen (Porsche 911 RSR #92): "This race was really exhausting and long. Kévin did a great job at the start. Unfortunately I then had bad luck with the tyres and lost positions and we never managed to really catch up again, even if at times the situation looked promising."

Matt Campbell (Porsche 911 RSR #77): "I'm absolutely thrilled to have won again. After the first half of the race we thought we couldn't do much better. But the fact that the number 56 and 90 cars were then handed a time penalty due to pitting under yellow put us back into contention. This was anything but an easy race, but our car was fast and we made the right strategic deci-sions."

Julien Andlauer (Porsche 911 RSR #77): "In my first stint I didn't do such a great job – I stressed the tyres a little too much while pursuing the leader. After talking with the engineers my second stint went much better. We definitely had luck on our side when the penalty was handed to our rivals. Still, we were in the right place when it mattered. In the end we performed strongly as a team and can be proud."

Jörg Bergmeister (Porsche 911 RSR #56): "That was a race with a lot of highs and lows. We held the lead over long stretches, but then came into the pits under safety car conditions. Unfor-tunately we received a 75-second stop-and-go penalty, which threw us down to fifth place. Luckily I managed to work my way up to third place in the last lap — a conciliatory result for us."
